

MEAP Results Sent Home

MEAP scores have arrived and were sent home with the 3rd, 4th and 5th grade. Our students continue to do an excellent job! Third, fourth and fifth graders were tested in math, reading and writing. Fifth graders were also tested in science. Each score reflects the percentage of students that met or exceeded the Michigan standard for that content area.

The reading sub test includes a writing section in which students are required to write a response to what they read. They are asked to make connections between two different reading selections and use key ideas from each one to support their position. All

required writing is hand-scored using a holistic scoring system.

We continue to work to better to understanding the 4th grade writing scores, especially in respect to our 3rd and 5th grade scores. As we do so, we continue to examine our students' writing and refine our writing curriculum to increase our students' writing proficiency.

Scores represent fall testing over the past 3 years.

Class Placement for 2008-9

Please understand that no decisions have been made regarding staffing or staff assignments. Most teachers would like to stay in the grade they are presently teaching (or as close to it as possible). Ms. Campos, 2nd grade, has extended her maternity leave for next year and therefore will not be returning in the fall. Although we expect most of our current staff to return, we cannot guarantee that a particular teacher or teaching situation will be available next year.

Class configurations will not be finalized until late August when our student numbers are closer to being confirmed. However, we do begin to consider student placement now. We will thoughtfully and thoroughly consider all factors when designing a balanced classroom community. (See the March edition of the Press for more details)

The intent is to create the best learning environment for all of our students. Families wishing to share any educational information regarding their child's placement for the 2008-09 school year may do so by writing a letter to me. All letters need to be submitted by Wednesday, April 30.

From our PTO Presidents

Thanks to all who attended the PTO meeting on March 20! We discussed the upcoming May 6 ballot which includes two questions that would renew the existing property tax millages which fund nearly half of the AAPS's operating budget as well as a sinking fund that helps pay for building repair and maintenance. These millages replace identical existing provisions which expire at the end of next year, therefore passage of them will not result in a tax increase. As they are critical sources of revenue for the district, passage of the renewals is a must.

Luciana Borbely and Julaine LeDuc, ambassadors from the University Musical Society, presented on the wide range of musical and dance performances that the UMS makes available to students of the AAPS. They offer discounted tickets to daytime performances as well as curriculum guides and workshops so that interested teachers can prepare their students for attendance at these performances. Additionally, UMS has a program "classical kids" which allows students in grades 1 - 8 and their parents to purchase tickets to all classical music concerts at significantly discounted prices. Finally, discussion centered on the PTO surplus funds and ideas for how to use them. We voted to allocate \$6000 of the surplus this year to a Platinum Apple grant program for teachers; this will be similar to our Golden Apple program but with a cap of \$2000 instead of \$500. Preference will be given to

grants that are grade-wide or multi-grade. Grants will be reviewed and voted on at the May PTO meeting. Additionally, a significant portion of the surplus will be held in reserve for requests that may come to the PTO during the construction phase. All of these requests will be discussed and voted on at a PTO meeting. Last, we are in favor of using a smaller portion of our surplus (\$1,000 - \$1,500) to make a one time contribution to the district wide "Village Fund" that is being created by the Student Participation Opportunities Team (SPOT) This fund will be held by the Ann Arbor Public Schools Educational Foundation and elementary PTO's will be able to apply for funding to allow low-income students to participate in the daily events of school (i.e. field trips, school pictures, Scholastic Book Fairs, ice cream socials etc.) There will be a final vote on this contribution at the April PTO meeting. Walk And Talk Starts Back Up This Spring

Spring is in the air and Walk and Talk is beginning again. Walk and Talk is an activity where the students gather to walk or run with each other around a specified loop at Burns Park. The kids earn “toe tags” for a certain number of loops around the park and really are motivated by the fresh air, their friends and the encouragement of the parent volunteers.

We had a great turn out this Fall and want to be prepared to run together as the Walk and Talk team for the upcoming Burns Park Run, Sunday, May 4 and help those kids participating in the Martian Marathon conclude their 26.2 miles.

We are hoping to start up the week of March 31 (weather permitting) if we can get our parent volunteers in place by then. Walk and Talk will take place for the 4 weeks beginning on March 31 with the exception of our district spring break.

This wonderful activity can not take place without your help. If you cannot commit to a shift, we would also like to encourage parents to come and walk and talk with the kids – enjoy each other plus the added bonus of modeling/inspiring physical fitness too!

Walk and Talk & the Burns Park Run

If your child participates in the Burns Park Elementary Walk and Talk program during their lunch period, they are eligible to a part of the BP Walk and Talk team as we participate in the Burns Park Run on Sunday, May 4.

What does it mean to be on the Burns Park Walk and Talk Team? For those kids who are able to participate in the Burns Park Run, they receive a free Walk and Talk t-shirt to wear on race day, we gather together at the race for stretching and encouragement and then their off to the starting line. The younger kids are put into groups and assigned a volunteer parent who will walk/run the course with them.

In order to be on the team (and receive a t-shirt), we will ask the students to come twice a week to Walk and Talk and run/walk at least 3 laps when they come. This is something the kids can comfortably do in the given lunch recess time and builds up their endurance for the big race.

What do you need to do? Parents will need to register their child for the Burns Park Run by completing the official Burns Park Run registration form with the required payment (scholarships are available). Forms can be found on www.burnsparkrun.org. Please mark 5k run (unless anyone is doing the 10k). **The Walk and Talk t-shirt is different than the Burns Park Run t-shirt. Your child will receive a free Walk and Talk shirt to wear the day of the run. If you would like to purchase an official BP Run shirt indicate this on the registration form and pay accordingly.

Please also check your child's backpack for the Walk and Talk Team “form” later in April. Please complete and have your child return to the office as soon as possible. This helps me confirm who will be participating.
