

From our Principal

Dear Families,

As the holidays approach, I find myself recalling those priceless moments that I enjoyed with my son as he was growing up. Reading together was at the top of the list! Mem Fox, noted children's picture book author, has listed many ideas for reading together on his website. It is an old list, but a great one.

Mem Fox's Ten Read-Aloud Commandments

1. Spend at least ten wildly happy minutes every single day reading aloud.
2. Read at least three stories a day: It may be the same story three times. Children need to hear a thousand stories before they learn to read!
3. Read aloud with animation. Listen to your own voice and don't be dull, or flat, or boring. Hang loose and be loud; have fun and laugh a lot.
4. Read with joy and enjoyment—real enjoyment for yourself and great joy for your listeners.
5. Read the stories that the kids love over and over and over again, and always read in the same 'tune' for each book: i.e. with the same intonations on each page, each time.
6. Let children hear lots of language by talking to them constantly; or sing any old song that you can remember, or say nursery rhymes in a bouncy way; or be noisy together doing clapping games.
7. Look for rhyme, rhythm or repetition in books for young children, and make sure the books are short!

8. Play games with the things that you and the child can see on the page, such as finding the letters that start your child's name and yours, remembering that it's never work, it's always a fabulous game.
9. Never ever 'teach' reading or get tense around books.
10. Read aloud every day because you just love being with your child, not because it's the right thing to do.

MLK Day Honored at Burns Park

We will honor the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in many ways in our classrooms and Community Circles as we focus on the life skills of caring and being kind to others. We also encourage you to participate in the many local events scheduled for MLK day.

Writers Workshop and Word Study - What are "Seeds" and where are my child's weekly spelling words?

I wanted to take a moment to share some information about two components of your child's literacy instruction – writing and word study. This article was written by Carrie Dworkin, a 4th grade teacher at Burns Park and does a nice job of explaining two aspects of the curriculum.

In the first several weeks of school, students spend time developing "seeds" for their writing, based on their own life experiences (small moments). They then begin to develop these seeds into full writing projects by moving through the process of drafting, revising, editing and creating a final draft.

What is the difference between revising and editing?

Revising, the most difficult stage for many children, and even adults, involves monitoring our work for meaning or asking, "Does this make sense?" It, therefore, entails adding, deleting or rearranging words, phrases and sentences to make it easier for readers to understand our writing.

Editing, on the other hand, is the polishing stage, during which we check for spelling, punctuation,

capitalization and grammar. Since the process is circular, the emphasis is on students doing their best writing rather than completing pieces quickly. Does that make sense?

Many new parents wonder why they're not seeing weekly spelling words. Well, rather than assigning all students a set group of words to learn – words that some students may already know while others may not yet be ready to tackle – the district's word study program focuses on individualized spelling lists chosen from your child's own reading and writing. As we read through his or her work, we make lists of misspelled words for your child to include on a master "Words to Learn" list. Each week, the students then learn words through a process that entails choosing words, building them with magnetic letters, repeatedly saying and writing them (through a process called "Look, Say, Cover, Write, Check"), doing "buddy tests" during which partners take turns testing each other, making connections with other words that look and sound like those that we are learning, and taking a final test. The goal behind this process is to help students formulate good spelling strategies that will not only help them learn to spell these words but also become better spellers overall. Soon, your child's riteing weel look les lick thise...and more like this!

Parent Involvement Day

Mark your calendars now for NAAPID Day (National African American Parent Involvement Day). It is scheduled for Monday, February 9. On this day ALL parents are invited and encouraged to come to school

for some part or all day to experience the learning environment first hand. Look for additional information soon, but please plan on coming to school that day.

Bucketfiller Presentation

You are invited to attend a special adult presentation of the Bucketfilling assembly your children viewed in September. Mark your calendars for the evening of January 15 at 7:00. The PTO meeting will follow this presentation. Childcare will be provided.

As you will recall Bucketfiller's worked with all of our students to encourage them to reach out and care about others during an assembly and workshops for 4th and 5th graders in September. We are continuing this theme throughout the year in our classrooms, the playground, and Community Circles. The image of "bucket filling" is used to help students think about how filling another person's emotional bucket with good thoughts and feelings, also fills our own emotional bucket with good thoughts and feelings. It is a lesson in learning how being "other-centered" can feel good and help us take care of ourselves in the process. Please plan to join us for a fun filled evening.

Recess and Cold Weather

Now that the really cold weather is finally with us, we encourage you to remind your children to come to school every day dressed warmly and expecting to play outside. There are days in which the morning forecast justifies making plans for staying in for recess, but by the time noon rolls around the wind has died down, the sun has come out and we are ready to go outside for just a few short minutes of fresh air. Rest

assured that if it is too cold to be out for even a few minutes we will keep your children inside. If all students come to school dressed to go out then we will be ready to enjoy the sun and snow whenever we can. A few minutes of fresh air can make a world of difference in a child's ability to return to studying in the afternoon.

Snow Rules

It would greatly help us if you could reinforce a rule we have here at school. "snow stays on the ground". There should be no snowballs thrown at school or going to and coming from school. That includes no throwing or kicking snow at each other. As much fun as a friendly snowball fight can be, it can also be dangerous. Snowballs have been known to become more ice than snow or contain foreign matter in addition to snow. In those cases, serious injuries can result. Rather than take the risk, we just don't allow throwing of snow at all.

We also remind children that snow structures that are built at school don't belong to anyone. They are likely to be modified by others during the day. On the other hand, wantonly destroying what others have built – just to destroy it – is unkind and will not be allowed. We appreciate your reinforcing these ideas at home.





- From your FIND IT FAST (All Grolier Online) search results, simply click on the WEBSITES tab

Current Events/News

- From *Passport* or *Kids* under News Now, you can access at least three feature stories
- *Passport* additional news features:
 - Associated Press live news feed
 - International news sources

Homework Help

- Within *The New Book of Knowledge* database, click on HOMEWORK HELP on the left-hand side to get help with research, writing, and studying
- Within *Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia*, click on RESEARCH STARTERS for suggested topics as well as help with planning, writing, and citing references

Timelines

- *The New Book of Knowledge* and *Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia*: Click TIMELINES on the left-hand side

How to Search

1. Type your search term in the FIND IT FAST box
2. For Advanced or Boolean searching, click on ADVANCED SEARCH
3. Results are displayed in a tabbed format:
 - a. Encyclopedia Articles
 - b. Websites
 - c. Media
 - d. News Feature Stories
 - e. Magazines(Only relevant tabs will be displayed.)

Maps

From either homepage, click ATLAS. You can use the Atlas in four different ways:

- You can **search for a specific location**, by typing it in the MAP SEARCH box at the top.
 - 📷 Click on the camera icon and see a photo showing a place of interest
- **View four different types of maps** by selecting from those available within each map: Thematic (agriculture, population, etc.); Geopolitical; Exploration (shows routes of famous explorers); and Historical (maps showing old tribes)
- **Calculate the distance** between two points: click on Global Distances in the upper right-hand corner or on Local Distances in the upper left-hand corner
- **Find latitudes and longitudes** by clicking on Lats/Longs on the top left

Magazines

- Within an article, click the PERIODICALS or MAGAZINES button
- From your Grolier Online search results, simply click on the MAGAZINES tab

Dictionaries/Thesauri

There are two main ways to use the dictionaries and thesauri:

- From either homepage, click DICTIONARIES for a list of available dictionaries and thesauri
 - Type in your word
 - 🔊 Click on the small megaphone for an audio pronunciation
- **Cool Feature!** From *any* database, highlight a word you want to look up, double-click it, then click the DICTIONARIES button in the top right to see the definition
